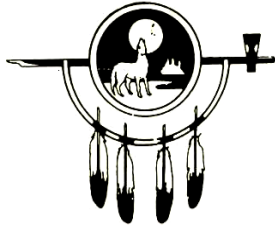
Temex Resources Corp. Shamed for Unethical Exploration Activity

Neskantaga First Nation publicly denounces publicly traded, mining corporation.

Neskantaga First Nation, ON - Neskantaga First Nation is publicly condemning and has issued a cease and desist order against Temex Resources Corp, a Toronto based junior mining company that is engaged in unethical exploration activity in the Northern Ontario First Nation's traditional territory without consent. As a result, Neskantaga First Nation refuses to recognize more than 100 claims registered by the company and it is no longer permitted to enter Neskantaga First Nation traditional lands.

Neskantaga First Nation is a pro-development community that has built successful working partnerships with multiple mining companies in its territory. These positive relationships are based on adherence to the First Nation's process of consultation with the community regarding proposed exploration and staking activities, and developing open dialogue and engagement with the local people.

Despite multiple communications with Temex Resources Corp over the last 5 months, the company is refusing to consult and work with Neskantaga First Nation. These actions by Temex Resources Corp are considered an unjustified infringement of the Aboriginal, Treaty and custodial rights of the First Nations people.



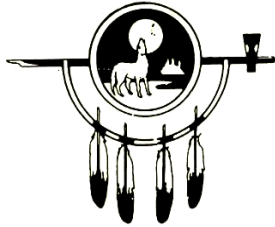

Says Roy Moonias of Neskantaga First Nation... *"Our First Nation has a mandate to follow the direction of what the community wants. Mining companies need to understand that they have to engage in meaningful dialogue that leads to fully informed decision making, at the community level. This is a process that works and has allowed other companies to build positive communications with our First Nation. Why should one company feel that they are different from the rest? When one company chooses not to follow this process, it puts other companies who are cooperative at an unfair disadvantage and worse still, it is a blatant sign of disrespect for our community and people. The actions of Temex Resources Corp. clearly show our people that this is an unethical and dishonest company that we would not choose to do business with. Therefore, they will not be allowed into our territory and they should be publicly shamed for their unethical actions."*

According to reports, there are currently 11 mining companies engaged in exploration activity in the traditional territories of Neskantaga First Nation, with companies such as **Superior Diamonds** working collaboratively with the community process. Although the Mining Act does not require companies to consult when it comes to exploration activities on Crown Lands, the Government of Ontario does make certain recommendations for consultation with First Nations.

"Part of the issue here is the lack of direct policy from the government when it comes to consulting with First Nations over Crown Lands," continues Roy Moonias. "The government can not have it both ways. These companies must be given a firm understanding of what is required from them in order to prevent these kinds of situations. The ethical and right thing to do is to work with First Nations but unfortunately some companies are only concerned about their own interests and can not be trusted to do what is right. Ontario needs to step forward and support First Nations in terms of enforcing a framework for consultation and accommodation."

The Neskantaga First Nation consultation process requires mining companies to meet with the community and provide them with information about who they are and what

programs and activities they are engaged in. This process often requires companies to provide information sessions directly to community members and has proven to be a very successful model for building good working relationships.

Neskanataga First Nation today announced that it will provide any interested mining company with more information of its consultation process and also announced plans to contact the shareholders of Temex Resources Corp. to advise the company's investors of its management's unethical working practices.

Temex Resources Corp. will not be permitted to pursue exploration activities in Neskantaga traditional lands until the company de-registers its claims and formally follows the process for consultation and consent.
