WHAT IS THE MATAWA TRANSITIONAL & HOUSING SUPPORT PROGRAM?

The Transitional and Housing Support Program provides support and services for women and their children who have experienced abuse to help connect them with community supports and find/maintain housing.

Transitional and Housing Supports Program also supports and assists women and their children to develop a transitional support plan and a safety plan.

WHAT TYPE OF SUPPORT IS AVAILABLE?

- Development of a transitional and safety plan (based on the principles of person centered planning, self-determination and choice)
- Securing legal assistance
- Finding and maintaining housing
- Applying for social housing
- Securing financial assistance
- Connecting with counselling and other support services
- Connecting with community resources (e.g. schools, legal)



The Matawa Transitional & Housing Program Support Program serves 5 remote fly-in First Nations (Eabametoong, Marten Falls, Neskantaga, Nibinamik & Webequie) with full time workers and two road accessible First Nations (Aroland & Constance Lake) with half time workers.

PEOPLE SERVED

Any woman, age 16 or older, who identifies herself or is identified as having been physically, sexually, or emotionally abused by her partner and/or significant other.

Any women, (age 16 or older, who identifies herself or is identified as abused) who may be currently receiving services from another agency or program.

Any women (age 16 or older, who identifies herself or is identified as abused) who resides in the community.
