# VISION

We will do whatever is necessary in order to protect our land, our water and our resources for the future generations. We agree that we must stand together in order to ensure our nation is protected. Therefore, we assert our Aboriginal and Treaty rights to the land, water and resources by requiring written consent before any development activity may proceed. Failure to consult, accommodate and receive the consent of the First Nation(s) to proceed with any work or activity is an unjustified infringement upon our Aboriginal, Treaty and Custodial rights as First Nations.

# MISSION

- 1. Protection of our land, our water and our resources.
- 2. Protection of our Rights as Peoples of the Land. We have Inherent, Aboriginal Title, Custodial and Treaty Rights.
- 3. We respect and trust the autonomy of each First Nation, respecting each other's priorities and paths to reach our common goals.
- 4. We want to maximize opportunities for our Peoples in any developments that they consent to, such as resource revenue and economic benefits.
- 5. We will achieve our goals through control and ownership of any development and activities in our territories.



The Matawa Chiefs Council passed 18 Resolutions in total in 2020/2021. This is down from 34 Resolutions the year before.

The Matawa Chiefs Council is comprised of nine (9) First Nations Chiefs of the Matawa First Nations. The Council provides overall strategic direction to the organization and broad governance on collective issues.

# **Chiefs Council Support Services**

### **OVERVIEW:**

The Matawa First Nations Chiefs Council consists of the nine (9) First Nations Chiefs who represent the Matawa First Nations communities and provide overall direction to the organization and broad decision making on collective issues. The mandate of the Chiefs Council Support Services is:

- To provide logistical, technical, policy and political advice to First Nations Chiefs both collectively and individually
- To support managers within Matawa First Nations Management and its subsidiary corporations
- To liaise with external organizations to support Matawa First Nation Chiefs, members and community aspirations

### CHIEFS COUNCIL OFFICE KEY PRIORITY AREAS:

#### Promote Health and Social Needs of Communities

- Worked with the Matawa Health Co-operative to meet unmet health needs in the First Nations. This became much more prominent with the COVID-19 Pandemic specifically with regards to the need for testing, nursing, medical advice and mental health services.
- Worked with the Awashishewiigiihiwaywiin (Matawa Social Services Framework) on children's and family support issues to reduce the risk of interacting with the child welfare system

 Worked with the Matawa Technical Services Department to lobby for cleaner drinking water in all Matawa First Nations and to support the Matawa Water Hub (Niibii Services) program

# Promote Education and Training of First Nation Members

- Supported Matawa Education Department and the Matawa Education Care Centre on addressing education needs and safety caused by COVID-19
- Supported the Matawa Education Department on Regional Education Agreements and the Matawa Waka Tare Language Revitalization Initiative
- Worked with the KIIKENOMAGA KIKENJIGEWEN Employment & Training Services (KKETS) Board of Directors to empower them in decision making.
- Supported KKETS in their apprenticeship program, the Discovery House Housing Initiative and better access to programs though the Starlink tele-communications system.

#### **Promote Safe Communities**

- Supported the Matawa Homeless Initiative, the needs of off-reserve members and food security to all Matawa members through traditional foods
- Lobbied for additional security and policing in First Nations
- Worked with Nishnawbe-Aski Police (NAPS) and Nishnawbe-Aski Legal Services on justice and safety issues for Matawa First Nations members and to appoint new board members to these organizations.

#### Support Regional Economic Development

- Supported the development of the Matawa Regional Economic Development Corporation
- Supported Four Rivers Environment on community education on Regional Impact Assessment.

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS:**

#### Education

 Additional capital funding for First Nations schools and the Matawa Education and Care Centre

#### **Economic Development**

 Establishment of Matawa Regional Economic Development Corporation with initial Board of Directors

#### Health

- Promotion of early vaccinations with ORNGE and the Matawa Health Co-operative for community members.
- Supported healthy communities in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic
- Secured additional public health nursing staff for First Nations

#### Infrastructure

- Improved water systems in some First Nations and Matawa Water Hub Program
- Installation of the Starlink dishes for improved broadband access as interim communications solution.
- Continuation of construction of the Rapid Lynx high speed broadband cable Initiative for long term tele-communication access.

#### **Regional Priorities and Jurisdiction**

 Recognition by provincial and federal government on the difficulty in pursing various provincial and federal resource legislation during a pandemic



### CHALLENGES:

#### COVID-19 Global Pandemic

 COVID-19 has affected First Nations profoundly. There has not been one area of life and decision which has not been affected by COVID-19. The pandemic has shown strengths in our First Nations but also weakness - housing, physical and mental health services, water, law enforcement, tele-communications infrastructure etc. It has also opened up new routes of communications and a willingness by federal and provincial governments to involve First Nations. Continuing the momentum, building on community strengths and lessons learned will be an important factor in going forward.

#### Capacity Building on Complex Items


 Larger initiatives in the area of environmental, economic development, health, social services and education governance takes time to develop and involved community members. Regional needs and building up communities is a fine balance which requires much more financial, human and technical resources to build a vision and how everything works together.

#### Communications

 Communications during the pandemic were very difficult due to the lack of broadband and specialized staff at the First Nations level. Community staff are focused on safety and life-saving measures during the pandemic in a way that supports safe distancing and other community protocols.

- Potential economic development changes in the Ring of Fire, Greenstone and other resource areas which could benefit First Nations
- Governance models in the areas of economic development, environment, social services, health and education.
- Increased capacity building and employment for First Nations members.

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council continue to identify the renewal and revitalization of our languages as a priority for our communities; and

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council mandate Matawa Education to continue to work with two current Indigenous Language Revitalization Specialist from New Zealand in the development and implementation of the Matawa Waka Tere program, including accreditation;

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council mandate Matawa Education to assist in facilitating the extension of the work visas of the two current indigenous Language Revitalization Specialist from New Zealand for the remainder of the project

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council mandate Matawa Education to continue to seek funding for the Matawa Waka Tara program through the Aboriginal Language Initiatives (ALI) or the NIB Trust Fund (NIBTF), as well as funding sources; and

**FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs direct the Matawa Education Department to provide regular updates to the Matawa Chiefs Council on the Matawa Waka Tere program.

#### UPDATE:

Matawa Education has completed the process of extending the work visas of the two Indigenous Language Revitalization Specialists from New Zealand. The work permits have been extended to April 15, 2023, and the New Zealand Indigenous Language Revitalization Specialists are seeking Permanent Residency which will allow them to work with Matawa Education indefinitely.

Matawa Education has continued to seek funding for the Matawa Waka Tere program through identified funding programs. Despite submitting an application for Indigenous Languages Initiative (ILC – formerly known as ALI) funding on February 22, 2021, Matawa Education is still awaiting a decision, and in May 2021, provided the Matawa Chiefs with a briefing note and presentation by Sharon Nate, Executive Director outlining issues we have faced with funding for language revitalization.

Year 1 of the Matawa Waka Tere program is complete for the Ojibwe and Oji-Cree languages. The Cree module was nearly completed before the passing of the Cree Language Specialist Suzan Sandau in February 2021 and is currently on hold. Year 2 Curriculum and programming is being developed for the Ojibwe and Oji-Cree languages. The language team plans to consult with language speakers from Matawa communities to seek input into the curriculum during the months of June and July. It is anticipated that the Year 1 program will be delivered in applicable Matawa communities beginning in October pending funding and challenges related to accreditation being mitigated.


- 1. Economics Financial Strategy

**FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Regional Priorities & Jurisdiction Department continue with the activities as presented and prepare materials for the Matawa Chiefs Council reviewed and direction.

#### UPDATE:

The Regional Priorities and Jurisdiction (RP&J) Department continue the work of research and collaboration with other Matawa Departments and Matawa Corporations. As directed, the Regional Priorities & Jurisdiction Department have implemented and are taking specific consideration to items identified by communities to prepare a report for the Matawa Chiefs Council consideration at the 2021 Annual General Meeting.

**Reporting and Information Collaboration** - Since the 2020 Matawa AGM, the RP&J Department has compiled the briefing notes and materials since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic into a binder for each Chief and Council for community review and information. The RP&J Department has also continued monitoring government, industry and issues emerging across Canada since the last in-person meeting of the Matawa Chiefs Council and will be providing a further update via briefing notes shortly on major issues identified by the Chiefs.

**THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs support the development of a Homelessness Strategy for Matawa members that would include a long-term vision for all Matawa members; and

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that this strategy would be guided by a Task Force to assist in its development that could consist of community members, urban members and Matawa First Nations Management managers;

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that this Task Force would look at the following:

- Number of Matawa Homelessness or at risk of Homelessness
- Needs of Matawa Members Groups i.e.: Elders, Youth, Families, those leaving Corrections, Disabilities, etc.
- Support services required to assist Matawa Members (i.e.: Navigators, Mental Health, Addiction, Life skill, Employment, etc.)
- Capital and financing requirements for various types of housing in both the short and long term,
- Linkages between members and their First Nation
- Liaison with other service agencies
- Co-ordination and integration of the various Matawa Housing Program into the Homelessness Strategy
- Land-based activities, program and support development
- Review any previous studies or reports conducted by organization such as Nishnawbe Aski Nation, etc.
- Other issues that may arise

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Task Force seek funding from various sources to assisting in their needs and on-going housing needs of Matawa members; and

**FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Task Force present the Matawa Homelessness Strategy to the next Matawa First Nations Annual General Meeting (AGM) in 2021.

#### UPDATE:

Due to COVID-19 and a number of crises that have taken place throughout the global pandemic, the Matawa Task Force on Homelessness was not struck until May 2021. In that time, the Task Force met on a regular basis to familiarize themselves with the homeless-serving sector in Thunder Bay and to determine where gaps and overlaps might exist (a presentation with respect to a framework for a strategy is to be presented under separate cover). One of the recommendations will be to have better participation in Thunder Bay's next Point in Time (PiT) homelessness count.

On June 10, 2021, the Task Force submitted a Concept Paper to Service Canada's 'Reaching Home – Community Capacity and Innovation Funding' for a 3-year project to look at a more rights-based approach to homelessness in the city of Thunder Bay and to potentially secure a Housing Policy Analyst who would be able to look at other models where Indigenous organizations are servicing their own homelessness populations in other cities throughout the country. A response is anticipated back prior to the Matawa 2021 AGM (an updated report will also be provided). A funding proposal was also submitted on June 28, 2021 to: Community the Community Entity of the Community Advisory Board (which in Thunder Bay, is the Thunder Bay Indigenous Friendship Centre) for a Housing Navigator who can address shorter-term immediate needs of those experiencing or at-risk of homelessness. Some limited funding has also been secured from governments for COVID-19 support of the homeless this year.

Matawa participates in various homelessness related initiatives in Thunder Bay as follows: Thunder Bay Housing and Homeless Coalition, Thunder Bay Vulnerable Person Table, Released from Custody Task Force, Thunder Bay Urban Aboriginal Strategy, Our Health Counts, Indigenous Food Circle, and the Lakehead Social Planning Council.

At the Matawa level, District of Thunder Bay Social Services Administration Board (TBDSSAB) funding was secured for youth homelessness beds at Matawa Education & Care Centre and Community Kitchen for Awashishewiigiihiwaywiin at the Matawa Training and Wellness Centre. Eight new one-bedroom housing units opened through the Matawa Not-For-Profit Housing Corporation with TBDSSAB funding. Matawa is seeking ten family apartments for homeless partners and children and 40 transition beds for KKETS at the Matawa Training and Wellness Centre. Funding has been secured and staff hired for the Matawa Wiichiihehwaywin Street Outreach program (originally from February – March 2021 and renewed for June 1 – November 30, 2021).

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that Matawa Chiefs Council support the promotion of and parenteral dialysis education at the community level; and

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council support the development of two (2) northern hub programs for renal dialysis in the North as no renal dialysis centre in any community or surrounding municipality; and

**FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED** that the Matawa Chiefs Council support the development of partnerships and funding applications with all levels of government, universities, hospitals, foundations and the private sector the Matawa Rental Dialysis Strategy; and

**FINALLY, BE IT RESOLVED** the Matawa Chiefs Council support the added support services for renal patients to make their life easier in term of housing, transportation, special food, and transitions.

#### UPDATE:

Initial discussions are set to start with Thunder Bay Regional Health Sciences Centre on a decentralized renal strategy with the Matawa Health Co-operative. As food security research study with Lakeahead University and one Matawa First Nation has been initiated showing impacts of food insecurity and dialysis.
